t the group level, a concern for justice is the indispensable compass in collective decision making, because it is the only means by which unity of thought and action can be achieved.

Far from encouraging the punitive spirit that has often masqueraded under its name in past ages, justice is the practical expression of awareness that, in the achievement of human progress, the interests of the individual and those of society are inextricably linked.

However constructive and noble the goal,
however significant to one's life or to the welfare of one's family,
it must not be attained through improper means.

Regrettably, a number of today's leaders—political, social, and religious—
as well as some of the directors of financial markets,
executives of multinational corporations, chiefs of commerce and industry,
and ordinary people who succumb to social pressure
and ignore the call of their conscience, act against this principle;
they justify any means in order to achieve their goals.

The light of men is Justice.

Quench it not with the contrary winds of oppression and tyranny.

The purpose of justice is the appearance of unity among men.

The ocean of divine wisdom surgeth within this exalted word, while the books of the world cannot contain its inner significance.

he perpetuation of ignorance is a most grievous form of oppression... Access to knowledge is the right of every human being, and participation in its generation, application and diffusion a responsibility that all must shoulder in the great enterprise of building a prosperous world civilisation each individual according to his or her talents and abilities. Justice demands universal participation... Social change is not a project that one group of people carries out for the benefit of another. The scope and complexity of social action must be commensurate with the human resources available in a village or neighbourhood to carry it forward. Efforts best begin, then, on a modest scale and grow organically as capacity within the population develops.

ustice is indeed essential to resist the vain imaginings and idle fancies of social and political machinations, to see reality with one's own eyes, and to identify the requirements for an equitable social order.

But then unity is essential—forged through consultative processes, including action and reflection—to achieve the power required for positive social change.

hen perfect justice reigns in every country of the Eastern and Western World, then will the earth become a place of beauty. The dignity and equality of every servant of God will be acknowledged; the ideal of the solidarity of the human race, the true brotherhood of man, will be realised; and the glorious light of the Sun of Truth will illumine the souls of all men.

From them are revealed such blessed and perspicuous words as are the cause of the well-being of the world and the protection of the nations.

ust as forgiveness is one of the attributes of God's mercy, so is justice one of the attributes of His lordship. The canopy of existence rests upon the pole of justice and not of forgiveness...

In sum, the proper functioning of the body politic depends upon justice and not forgiveness.

So what Christ meant by forgiveness and magnanimity is not that if another nation were to assail you; burn your homes; plunder your possessions; assault your wives, children, and kin; and violate your honour, you must submit to that tyrannical host and permit them to carry out every manner of iniquity and oppression. Rather, the words of Christ refer to private transactions between two individuals, stating that if one person assaults another, the injured party should forgive.

He verily is the ornament that adorneth the brow of peace and the countenance of security.

There can be no doubt whatever that if the daystar of justice, which the clouds of tyranny have obscured, were to shed its light upon men, the face of the earth would be completely transformed.

O Thou Who endowest every just power and equitable dominion with abiding glory and everlasting might, with permanence and stability, with constancy and honour! Aid Thou by Thy heavenly grace every government that acteth justly towards its subjects and every sovereign authority, derived from Thee, that shieldeth the poor and the weak under the banner of its protection. I beseech Thee, by Thy divine grace and surpassing bounty, to aid this just government, the canopy of whose authority is spread over vast and mighty lands and the evidences of whose justice are apparent in its prosperous and flourishing regions. Assist, O my God, its hosts, raise aloft its ensigns, bestow influence upon its word and its utterance, protect its lands, increase its honour, spread its fame, reveal its signs, and unfurl its banner through Thine all-subduing power and Thy resplendent might in the kingdom of creation. Thou, verily, aidest whomsoever Thou willest, and Thou, verily, art the Almighty, the Most Powerful.
